










FROM MONEY TO MINISTRY 2015 NARRATIVE BUDGET





A FORMULA FOR MINISTRY

Apportionments fund ministry. Each year, annual conference members set the amount churches will contribute in apportionments using a formula.

At the center of this formula is the apportionment base, which is determined by statistics on how much money a church spends on itself. Things like salaries, church programs, building maintenance and operating expenses are included. Money spent on missions, clergy benefits and capital improvements are not.

Apportionments are calculated using the formula:

X BENEVOLENCE FACTOR

YOUR APPORTIONMENT

For 2015, the proposed benevolence factor is 17.75 percent.

For every dollar put in a collection plate, 89 cents stays with your local church. The remaining 11 cents supports ministries beyond the local church. About 2.5 cents of that apportionment goes to support the General Church*, which is global in its membership, mission and ministry.

*Your 2.5 cents that supports the General Church goes toward the World Service Fund, Africa University Fund, Black College Fund, Episcopal Fund, General Administration Fund, Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, Ministerial Education Fund and Northeast Jurisdictional Apportionments.

NARRATION OF 2015 PROPOSED BUDGET

Benevolence Factor – Proposed 2015: 17.75%

The benevolence factor is the percentage churches are apportioned based on their operating expenditures less exclusions (i.e. missions, clergy benefits and capital expenditures). The percentage for 2015 is the same as the percentage used in 2014.

Apportionment Collection Rate - Proposed 2015: 92.0% *The projected collection of the amount apportioned to churches in the 2015 Budget is 92.0%.*

REVENUE

Apportionments: \$14,180,304

A church's share of the local and global mission work and operating expenses of the Annual Conference as determined by the apportionment formula.

Grants: \$113,300

This represents grants given directly to the conference for ministry and mission. For example, General Church grants to operate the Episcopal Office and residence.

Event Registration: \$2,006,968

This includes Annual Conference registration, workshop registrations, camping and retreat registrations (majority of line item) and other conference events.

Publications: \$19,176

This includes sales or rentals of publications, DVDs, paid UMConnection subscriptions and other materials.

Individual Gifts:

Gifts coming from individuals for specific programs. These are for the conference specifically rather than for ministries outside of the conference. No such gifts are anticipated in 2015.

Reimbursements: \$62,449

The conference receives reimbursements from denominational agencies for specific operating programs. The Trustees are reimbursed for the expenses of property upkeep when that property is sold.

Other Income/Sources of Funds: \$919,189

Miscellaneous income or sources of funds, such as the use of funds held from previous years, funding from agency reserve funds, etc.

Interest: \$30,000

An estimate of the interest the conference will earn on operating funds through its investments.

Total Operating Revenue: \$ 17,331,386

EXPENSES

I. DISCIPLESHIP

Regional Ministry: \$2,424,660

Operate the ministries and provide administrative support to the Regions. The geographic regions include the Annapolis-Southern Region, Baltimore Region, Washington Region, and Western Region.

Discipleship Ministry Teams

Connectional Ministries: \$2,484,710

Funds to operate the ministries and administrative aspects of the Connectional Ministries Team. Administrative expenses include salary expense, benefits, travel, and continuing education. Ministries funded by Connectional Ministries include work with children, youth and young adults, campus ministry and camping ministries. Funds are also allocated for the Discipleship Council, Connectional Table and Ministry of the Laity.

a. Youth Ministry Includes ROCK and other programs

- to make, engage and support young disciples of Jesus Christ.
- b. Camping Ministries provide opportunities for spiritual growth and formation for children and adults.
- c. Campus Ministries includes activities of young adult ministry on area college campuses.

Focus on Missions & Advocacy:

a. Conference Mission and Social Justice Programs: \$534,362

Through grants to specific Social Justice Ministries such as Action for the Homeless, Appalachian Development and UM Community Services, the conference seeks to grow mission and ministry.

This ministry area also includes funds for our advocacy partnership ministries in other conferences, such as Zimbabwe, Korea, Latin America and Russia. Funds are also devoted to the Hope for the City Initiative, Deaf Ministries and Justice for Our Neighbors.

b. General and Jurisdictional Apportionments: \$3,493,309

The funds that the denomination and Northeast Jurisdiction request for ministry and programs from each conference. The conference is proud of its track record of paying 100% of these apportionment askings, consistently, for more than a decade. They include contributions to these specific funds:

i. World Service

Helps our denomination to strengthen its evangelism efforts, stimulate church growth, expand Bible studies and enrich spiritual commitment. This fund allows



us to share in a worldwide ministry, including support for missionaries.

- ii. Interdenominational Cooperation Allows United Methodists to have an effective presence in the activities of ecumenical organizations.
- iii. Africa University
 Supports the further development of the
 first private pan-African university for
 men and women in Zimbabwe.
- iv. Black College Fund
 Represents the denomination's support
 of the operation and capital funding of
 historically black colleges and medical
 schools.
- v. Ministerial Education Fund

 Provides for the recruitment and
 education of future pastors and bishops.
- vi. Episcopal Fund
 Pays the salaries and benefits of active
 bishops in the denomination and
 supports retired bishops.
- vii. General Administration
 Supports administrative areas of the church, such as the General Council on Finance and Administration, the General Conference session, and Archives and History.
- viii. Jurisdictional Administration Supports mission and ministry throughout the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

<u>Congregation & Leadership Development:</u> \$173,444 Funds to operate the ministries and administrative aspects of the Congregation and Leadership Development (CLD) Team. Administrative expenses include salary expense, benefits, travel and continuing education. Ministries funded by this area include a focus on church growth and leadership.

Focus on Church Growth: \$1,469,640

- a. Grants to local churches and ministries to grow congregations and expand ministry in the community.
- *b. New church starts*
- c. Latino/Hispanic Ministries
- d. Strengthening the Black Church

Focus on Leadership: \$291,103

- a. Certified Lay Ministry Learning opportunities and training for all congregations with a focus to develop current and future leaders within the church.
- b. Discipleship Boards and Agencies Includes funds for Board of Ordained Ministry and Ministerial Education Fund.

Total Discipleship Ministry Teams: \$8,446,568

TOTAL DISCIPLESHIP: \$10,871,228 (Discipleship Ministry Teams + Regional Ministry)

II. STEWARDSHIP

Communications: \$586,848

Informs, equips, engages and inspires church leaders through a variety of ministry tools, including the UMConnection newspaper, the bwcumc.org Web site, Facebook and the e-connection.

Operations: \$2,736,284

Oversee and maintain the operations of the conference including all conference infrastructures, facilities, IT, conference owned property, and relates to the Trustees and CFA.

Property Ministries

Conference Trustees; oversee all property owned by the conference and the management of the Conference Mission Center.

Archives and History

The conference provides some of the ongoing support for the preservation of our United Methodist Church heritage.

Conference Chancellor

Provides legal resources to the Trustees and other conference leadership.

Annual Conference – Commission on Sessions
Prepares all aspects of the annual conference
session. Implements the programs and oversees
logistics while on-site.

Finance: \$495,594

Maintains and administers comprehensive fiscal and administrative policies and services. The office of the treasurer also provides support and information for clergy and laity in the local churches.

HR/Benefits Administration: \$2,208,997

Administers all clergy and laity benefit plans. Responsible for Human Reserouces for Conference Staff. Retiree Benefits

Health insurance premiums for retired conference clergy.

TOTAL STEWARDSHIP: \$6,027,723

Episcopal Leadership Ministry: \$432,435 Ministries that lead our mission and develop the leadership to lead congregations, ministries and staff.

As United Methodists, we are linked together by more than our Christian faith. In our church, we say that we are "connectional." What that means is that we covenant together – we promise to each other – to share in ministry with each other around the corner and around the world.

Within The United Methodist Church, a portion of the money each local church receives goes beyond the walls of the building to enable ministry in hundreds of ways. This booklet highlights just a small sampling of some of the ministry you have made possible.

In the Baltimore-Washington Conference, when churches share their gifts – by paying their apportionments – they give about 11 cents of every dollar to the larger church outside their building. When your church pays 100 percent of its apportionments, you are helping train a pastor to become a leader and to preach every Sunday. You assist a retired clergy and her spouse to receive medical care. You reach out in life-transforming ways to people with AIDS, the homeless and children in need. You ensure college students away from home have a faith-place to call their own. You support a camping and retreat program that touches countless lives every year.

Apportionments bring the Gospel story to life in countless ways. They are the bridge between money and ministry.

This year, the Baltimore-Washington Conference Council on Finance and Administration is proposing a \$17,331,386 budget for 2015. Most of this budget will be paid for with apportionment funds.
